Fundraising

Fundraising is an integral part of not only keeping the lights on but also keeping your Unit active. An active Unit will thrive and then assist with more fundraising, and that is a win/win scenario. If your Unit has a need rally behind it to raise money, even if you have some set aside. People will rally behind a cause as they want a defined cause to support. After you receive a donation from an individual or a business, make sure that you thank them for their donation and let them know what you did with it. Donors get tired of giving money and never being thanked or knowing what the money went to help with. If you give a personal thank you, such as a letter with pictures of what you did and a quote or two about how it affected the people that benefited from the contribution, the donors will be more willing to contribute again in the future.

If you have Cadets, get them involved. Wreaths Across America is one great way to involve the Cadets as they can request donation for the wreath sponsorships and then go down and actually lay the wreaths on the graves of our fallen veterans. Every Cadet and SM that we have spoken with that has attended this event has been moved by it and has so many positive things to say about it. Donors love it when we come back with pictures of the Cadets laying the wreaths and hear the impact that it has on the Cadets. This past year we had a brand-new Cadet that got to go as a Civil Air Patrol member and lay a wreath on the grave of his father! Another way to get involved is to help your local VFW, American Legion, Lyons Club, or other local organizations and most in turn will donate to your Unit from their gambling funds. On top of that, all of the time the Cadets and SMs put into these events is community service and it brings the community service into your Unit as well as benefits the Unit.

If you have a major project, you can look into grants from Walmart/Sam's – just stay in your Unit's territory so other Units can request in their own territory. The secret is to submit the request online and then go in person to the facility and speak with the managers and explain your need and continue to keep in personal contact until the grant is approved. You can also go to any place that has pull tabs as they are required by law to donate a certain percentage of the profits to 501c3s. Make sure to get your Unit's Tax ID number and make sure to notify Wing that it is a donation and Wing will send the official Tax Donation form to them.

And last, but not least, promote Civil Air Patrol through your appearance and professionalism. Our Squadron has had multiple events that we have been asked to volunteer for and after the event was over, we have received a request from the organizations to attend a meeting and received unsolicited donations for our hard work and professionalism. Remember we are the face of the United States Air Force Auxiliary!
